## ADMINISTRATION ACHIEVES EFFECTIVE SCHOOL COORDINATION






Vice-President Hal Morgans, President Fred Jones, and Secretary Cathy O'Connor provided leadership for the Student Congress during the first semester.

Taking over the responsibilities of Activities Director in January, Miss Grove coordinated group efforts and individual interests.



## LANTERN KEEPS PACE WITH SCHOOL NEWS




















## '63 MATMEN WIN SECTION 1 TITLE


Losing only one match in two years, Rich Ruben with a 28-1 overall record, proved to be one of the best wrestlers in Mt. Lebanon's history.

















