a need for something more than yourself.








In a big, busy world, each one must prove a few

and other burdens—


Renewing a vital part of you in a swift-flying hour with friends,

the development of vital interests.






One who for various reasons finds an inescapable burden

tomorrow it will be remembered.







An impersonal phrase blanketing a limitless field

But nevertheless a part of a school, an education, a building, yourself.






A lot of little things thrown together:

Through the efforts of the superintendents, principals, and school board members, the various complexities and challenges of modern education are met and overcome to make the highest degree of learning possible in the Mt. Lebanon Public Schools. In formulating school policy, investigating a new curriculum in music, or rescheduling a boy who was programmed into 911 Girls' Gym, the administration strives to provide a comprehensive, modern education.



This, then, shows the wide scope of Mt. Lebanon education. From the highly technical knowledge gained in a physics course to the practical information obtained in a health class, the high school student secures an all-encompassing yet highly personal education.

Agile fingers string watercolors, staple pink papers, collect slippery coins. Fits of pen and ink coax blank pages into meaning, into moods. Hammers and paintbrushes accompany the prattle of play practice. Thermometers or stencils replace study halls. Cavernous gymnasiums acquire personalities beneath rainbows of twisted streamers. A student-faculty basketball game adds two foreign accents to the community. Parliamentary procedure impels presidents to their feet. Ink-coated notepad in hand, interviewer searches for the word to encompass his subject's expression. Silver thumbtacks puncture picture schedules, caption lists, deadline rosters. Chewed pencil erasers and bitten fingernails stimulate mental struggles.





ACTIVITIES

Through Student Congress, Student Court, and

the Advisory Council, students gain an insight into parliamentary government, while actually playing a vital role in the operation of the school. The Student Congress, composed of representatives elected from all grade levels, serves as a link between the student body and administration. Whether through publishing the Student Directory or supervising the Cookies-for-Vietnam drive, Student Congress works to benefit all students of the high school. Student Court allows pupils to present their side of disciplinary problems to a reviewing board of twelve judges chosen from the student body. The Advisory Council provides another direct link between faculty and students, for members of this council meet, under Dr. Mills' supervision, to discuss the revised testing schedule and its effects on senior week or to consider other pertinent topics.

Many students receive awards from national

and community groups as well as from the school in recognition of outstanding academic or extracurricular achievement. The National Merit Scholarship program and the Cum Laude Society recognize students with outstanding scholastic ability at Mt. Lebanon. This year Mt. Lebanon had twenty-four semifinalists and fifty-eight commended students in the National Merit contest. The Cum Laude Society, a national honor society, accepted thirty-two new members from the class of 1966. In addition, individual achievement is recognized in several ways. The D.A.R. award is based on both character and scholarship. Activities keys and guards cite individual participation in school activities.



During 1965-1966 the **Mounty** enjoyed

one of its most successful years. The fall sales campaign, which featured Claude Waverly, the "Man from M.O.U.N.T.Y.," achieved the highest number of subscription sales in the history of the publication. Instead of publishing five short issues during the year as in previous years, the **Mounty** editors chose to print one comprehensive issue each semester, which included longer short stories, essays, and plays, and a much wider variety of types of writing. Thus the **Mounty** served its purpose as a vehicle for student self-expression through creative writing.



Eye-catching photos and banner headlines signal

the arrival of each month's issue of the **Lebanon Lantern**. The editorial staff of the **Lantern**, under the leadership of co-editors Larry Rosenberg and Tom Tewell, assigns news and feature stories for each issue to the reporters, and then works to revise and edit these stories before each month's deadline. Before the high school can present any

dramatic performance, at least four student organizations must function to synchronize lighting, scenery changes, distribution of properties and make-up calls. Working closely with the stage crew, the scenery squad not only designs but constructs the backdrops and furniture used for Mt. Lebanon High School plays. To create a realistic set, the properties committee often must locate unusual items, such as an old English bicycle or a basket of kittens. The make-up squad spends at least thirty minutes on all characters who appear on stage and as much as an hour on the lead roles. Together all four squads contribute to the success of Mt. 





















