





Though our summers are incredible, they are also short. Nonetheless, we always seem to spend our school years counting the days until those lazy days of summer are ours again.




Lebo Shows Its Spirit


















Homecoming Festivities Cheer Fans






As the final bell rings on Friday, one can practically hear the sound of relief echo throughout the halls. The weekend has begun!






Having a Snow- Ball!!


On Saturday, February 10, students went out into the cold and turned out for the annual Snowball Dance.





Here We Go!!



























Plowing Through Water

Swimming at Mt. Lebanon High School involves extreme dedication to the sport. Not only are practices every day after school until 6PM, but Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings at 6AM and Saturday mornings from 6:30 to 9AM. Most vacation days entail rigorous 3-hour practices. Even Christmas vacation is spent in the pool for some of the the hardest days of practice.










Spreading the News








This past summer, the German Club organized a trip in which students spent three weeks in Germany. They spent some of the time with German host families, and the rest touring Germany and surrounding countries.



Making Music














Behind the Scenes







Mt. Lebanon's social studies department offers students an opportunity to learn about the past, live knowingly in the present, and prepare for the future.





Math, Mt. Lebanon Style





A Change of Pace








The Colophon

If You're actually reading this, you're probably wondering, "What is a colophon?" Well, a colophon is what we editors write to fill you in on what goes on behind the door marked "Log Office." For starters, this is the first time in its history that **The Log** has been put together using a desktop publishing system. All copy and layouts for the sixtieth volume of **The Log** were designed using Ultravision, a software program by Taylor, and were electronically produced using a Pentium computer by Vektron and a 5MP Laser Jet printer by Hewlitt Packard.

The 1996 **Log** was printed by Taylor Publishing Company in Malvern, PA, with a press run of 216 pages and 1000 copies. It is printed on premium 80# enamel paper with 24 pages of four color and two flats of spot color. The lithographed, mylar laminated cover features the same special inks (metallic blue and sunspot yellow) used in the sports section. The coordinating school designed endsheets are also printed in metallic blue. The **Log** editors chose opus standard for body copy and captions and used opus bold for headlines. Amazonia was chosen for emphasis in the four color section.





Air Force Capt. Scott O'Grady earned the admiration of the nation for surviving six brutal days in a Bosnian forest after being shot down by Serbian gunfire.




Merger mania reached a peak when Time-Warner and Turner Broadcasting joined forces, creating the world's largest media company.






