






Lebo "Unplugs," Returns to Basics

The LOG Takes this Year to Relate Music to Real Life

"Video killed the radio star..." sang The Buggles on August 1, 1981 at exactly 12:01 am, the launching date of Music Television, a station known simply as **MTV**. While they "killed the radio star," music videos gave birth to a new medium for teenage expression, a new direction for television programming and a completely new generation. We, the students of Mt. Lebanon High School for the 2001-2002 academic year, can easily and rightfully

be classified as part of the **MTV** generation.

Growing up in a Mount Lebanon without the many influences of **MTV** would be as inconceivable as our parents growing up without "The Brady Bunch." While we grew taller and older during the late 1980s and early 1990s, the hair of our neighborhood teenagers also grew -- puffier and higher, that is -- as they mimicked Paula Abdul or Def Leppard.

As a result of the cult-like

attractiveness of **MTV**, we watched our older sisters and baby-sitters idolize Madonna while fantasizing about Billy Idol or the New Kids on the Block. Unfortunately, "Music" Television continually focused on the appearances of artists in their videos rather than concentrating on the actual music or its messages.

Sometime in the early 1990s a program called **MTV Unplugged** allowed video jockeys to introduce live artists rather than their music videos. **MTV** dropped the flashy gimmicks of producing popular videos and returned to the basics of music. To commemorate twenty years of culture, controversy, and creativity, we are taking this year of the publication of the Lebanon LOG to "unplug."

The LOG staff feels the students at Mt. Lebanon are ready to go beyond the shock value and superficiality of music videos and get back to the basics, not only in music but also in everyday life. 


A Rothschild giraffe nuzzles junior David Schiffman at Giraffe











After the assembly, Dr. Adams volunteers to stay and answer any questions from students. Although it was Friday afternoon, many students remained and posed questions ranging from Dr. Adams' eccentric clothing, to what advice he would offer high school students interested in volunteering and humanitarianism.

Friday afternoon, the South gym's bleachers and floor served as seating for two thousand students, faculty members, and parents. If it weren't for the banners that read "Be Friendly", "Share Beyond Belief", and "Gesundheit! Institute" and students wearing red clown noses, one might have thought it was a pep-rally. The star of this particular assembly was not an athlete, but rather the famous Dr. Hunter "Patch" Adams.

During the assembly, Dr. Adams emphasized the value of humor, love, and compassion in an increasingly fast-paced and materialistic society. He addressed the reciprocal joy in serving others and advocated a class on the subject of love. Additionally, he discussed his Gesundheit! (which means good health in German) Institute in W. Virginia along with its policy of providing free health care and not carrying malpractice insurance. Along the way, Dr. Adams also expressed his personal political views. He criticized American foreign policy for issuing embargoes against its political enemies, holding such embargoes responsible for generating economic hardship and starvation in those countries. In regard to the war in Afghanistan, Dr. Adams expressed his belief in pacifism.

While many people felt inspired by Dr. Adams' message of love and compassion, others felt that making politically controversial statements was inappropriate at a school assembly. Overall, the assembly can be best characterized as thought provoking.





But first and foremost, "I Remember Mama." In John Van Druten's classic story, a Norwegian immigrant family is held together by a strong, resourceful and untiring matriarch. 














MS. BARBARA SCHOMER ENGLISH
















"O" and "D," the Blue Devils had yet another great season.

























































Many had taken college visits over the summer and were secure in their higher learning choices. The teacher contract dispute had been settled and everything appeared to be back to normal. Yet on September 11, 2001, the graduating class witnessed an event that would forever set their last year of high school apart from any other.

The unbelievable earth-shattering events that occurred that Tuesday filled us all with indelible images that created a somber tone, pervading our everyday existence for many days to follow. And with the uncertainty felt by all, it is fitting that the Senior Class song, "Wish You Were Here" by Pink Floyd was chosen. This 70's anthem expresses a duality of emotion: the anxiety felt by a future clouded by war, and



the desire to be surrounded by loved ones in the face of tragedy. In order to return to normalcy and help those for whom that would be much more difficult, seniors organized a fundraiser that would directly benefit the victims and the survivors. During the two week campaign,


SENIOR SUPERLATIVES
