EXECUTIVE BOARD

As the basis for Mt. Lebanon's entire activity program, the Executive Board determines the plan by which more than a thousand students are governed. Composed of presidents from each homeroom, special representatives for twelfth grade, and three principal officers, it becomes the expression of the opinions and wishes of the student body.

During its weekly Friday meeting, the 1939-40 board discussed vital school problems, awarded new activity points, organized the Arts and Crafts Squad, sponsored the Activities Banquet, and took charge of school expenditures. These accomplishments, however, measure but a small degree of its authority over school life, not only in the immediate problems with which it deals, but in the training in character and citizenship it offers each student.

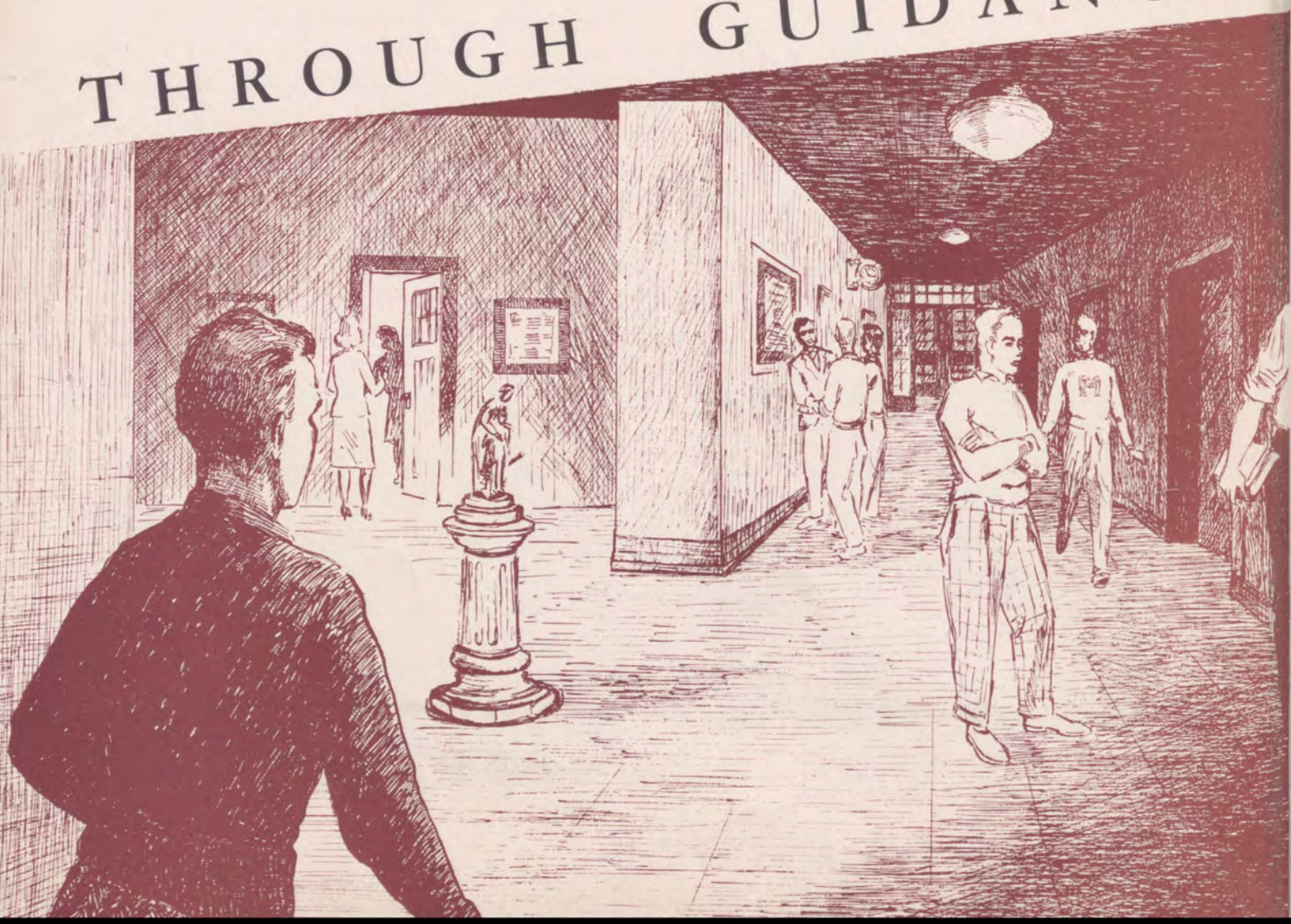

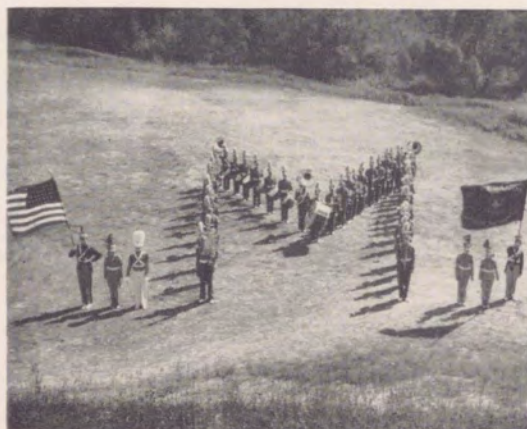
BAND

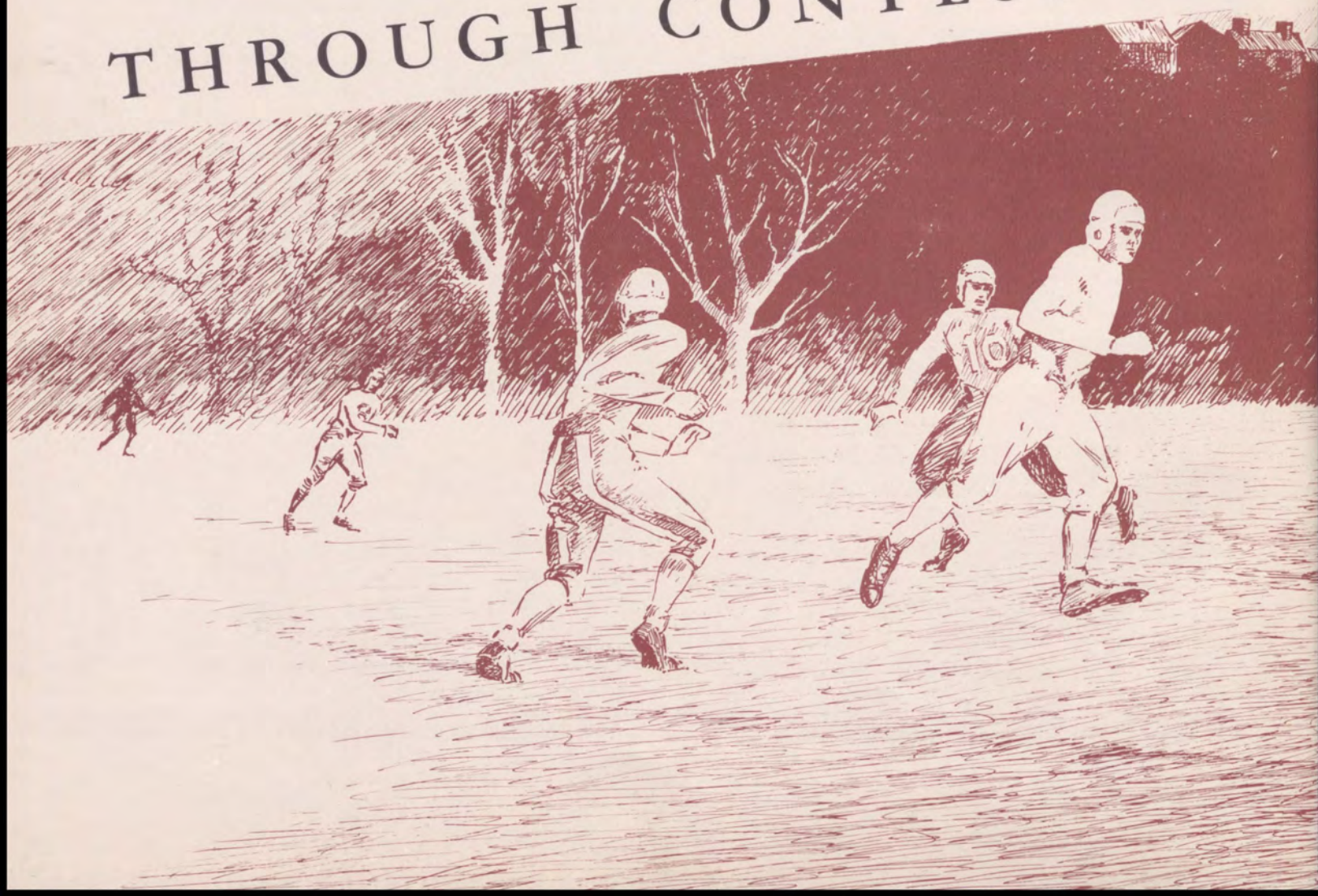

Candidates for next year's team realize that their experience this year will be of great value next season in their attempt to capture the championship of the league for Mt. Lebanon.



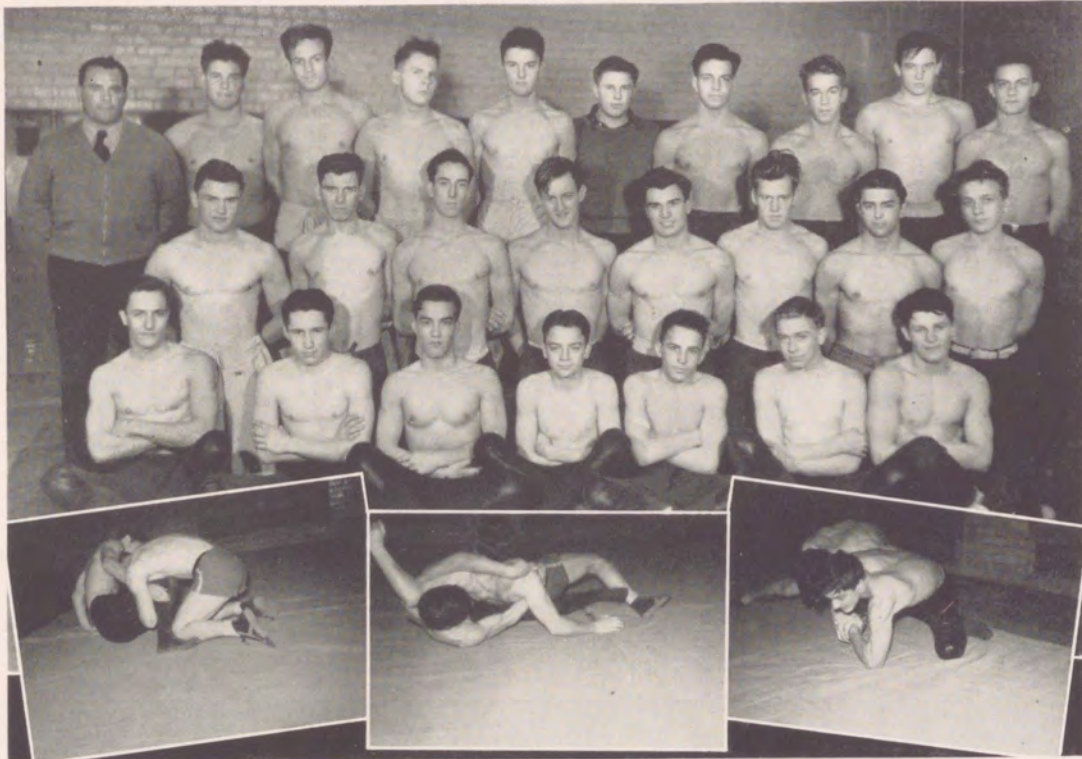
