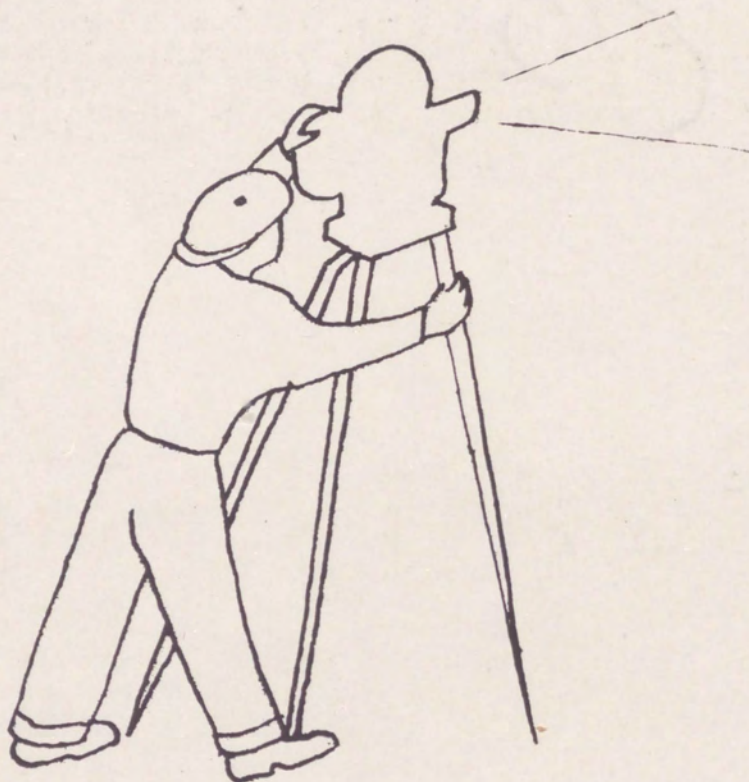

THE LANTERN

"The LANTERN shines tonight!" This was announced over the public address system once a month throughout the year to tell students that copies of our school newspaper were available. Few of us realize the work involved in producing a paper with school-wide appeal. In planning each issue, Editor-in-Chief Carole Gibson, Assistant Editor Getsy Kuhn, News Editor Jean Walker, Feature Editors Karen Maegerlein and Debbie Blair met with the sponsor, Miss McLaughlin, to discuss how the space would be used. Then, the editors assigned stories to the reporters. These stories were then proofread, typed, and their lines counted to see that the amount of copy was sufficient. When everything was in order, the material was sent to the printer, who soon mailed it back as eight long pink sheets. Four of these were again proofread, while their four duplicates were cut apart into stories; these were pasted over old LANTERNS by Makeup Editor Mary Lou Walker in the best possible newspaper form with appropriate headlines; once again they went back to the printer. Our gossip section, the Devilette, edited by Diane Smith and Nancy Brick, and the Roto, which the LANTERN received as a member of the Scholastic Press Association, were then assembled with the printer's finished product. Then we returned to our homerooms when we heard, "The LANTERN shines tonight!" to get our copies, placed there by Joan Leis and her circulation workers.

LEBANON LOG

"... and string along with us."

So ended the annual LEBANON LOG sales campaign.

This was, however, not the beginning. The work on the 1953 LOG had begun some six months previously with the photographing and collecting of information on the varied spring sports. While the book cover was being selected, Mr. Rosser, the school photographer, and the student photographers were taking pictures for the photo-laden pages of Mt. Lebanon's annual. In November of 1952, the literary staff began writing stories and captions as the art department was sketching and preparing the layout.

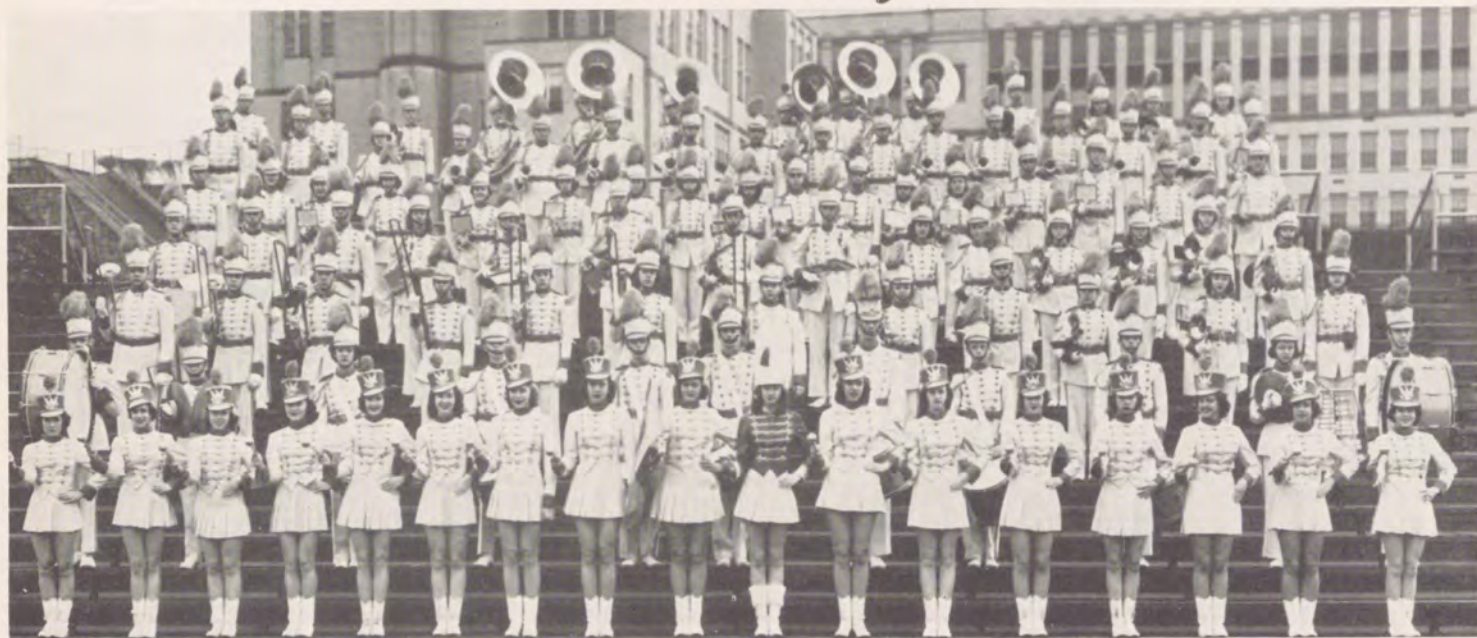

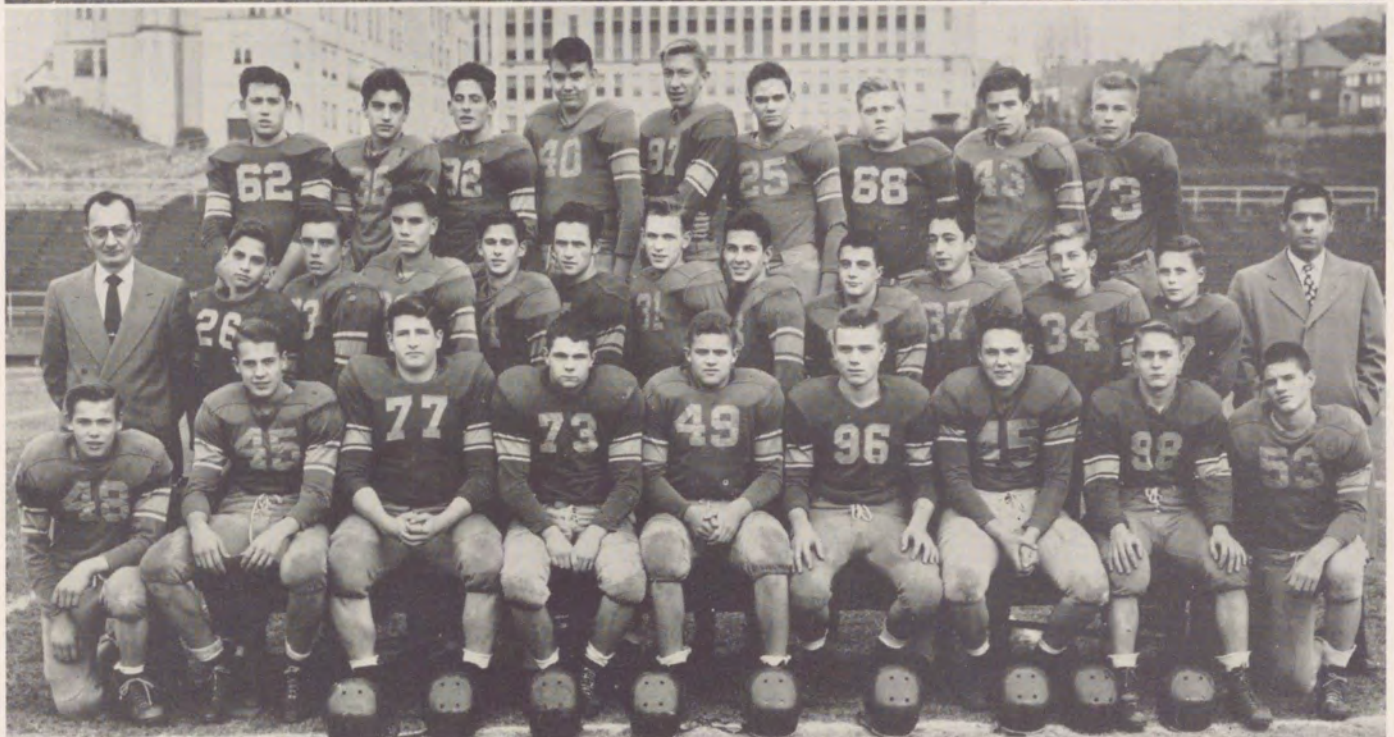

WPIAL Show For Sixth Time

The long-standing tradition of winning track teams was once more upheld as Mount Lebanon's trackmen swept all but one of its season's encounters.

The indoor season prophesied what was to come as the squad romped over Central Catholic and Scottdale in a triangular meet and followed up with a victory over Mansfield in the Tri-State Coaches Meet.

Dormont and Washington were defeated to open the outdoor season. Then came the Mansfield Relays where the Mounties placed eighth out of the more than seventy schools entered; Bob Cherry's win in the mile and Jack Bell's fourth place in the half mile made this possible. The team rolled over Penn and McKeesport but incurred their sole loss to Altoona by a 30½-28 score in the WPIAL Relays.

Central Catholic next fell prey to the Mounties at the Washington Invitational. This was the eleventh straight time that the meet was won by Mt. Lebanon.

The Blue and Gold rounded out the dual-meet season by scoring an impressive win over Ambridge.

Mt. Lebanon also took the Allegheny County Meet, outclassing its chief rival, Wilkinsburg, by more than 39 points. May 17 found the Mounties playing host to the WPIAL Meet. The Lebo's won this meet for the sixth time. The highlight was Bob Cherry's 4:31.5 mile, the second fastest

in WPIAL history and also a new school record.

At State College the WPIAL placed second, next to Philadelphia, with a score of 71-59½. Mt. Lebanon contributed thirteen points on wins by the 880 relay team of Klingensmith, Wells, Murray, and Billingsley, and seconds by Bob Cherry and Bruce Klingensmith in the mile and 220 respectively.
