




Our memories of our associations with Marilyn and Miss Zahniser will always be pleasant and happy ones.



School Board Planned New Annex

The Board of Education has possibly the greatest effect of any group on Mt. Lebanon High School. This body of eight, seldom seen as a group by the student body, has charge of the plans for the new high school wing. In this annex are planned an auditorium, able to accommodate the entire student body, modern classrooms to ease the strain on the already crowded school, much needed science laboratories, and a greatly increased library. The present school will be modeled to include new offices and a larger cafeteria. A similar project is being planned and carried out in the elementary schools, a far-sighted project calculated to keep Mt. Lebanon in its traditional place among the best schools of the state.

The Mt. Lebanon school system, however, lost its Assistant Superintendent on February 1. Dr. Ross M. Gill, in the district since 1931 and Assistant to Superintendent of Schools Ralph D. Horsman since 1946, became superintendent in Plainfield, New Jersey, on that date.

Cross Country Stretched Championships

At State To Seven

The 1953 cross country team added new laurels to Mt. Lebanon's long record of cross country triumphs. Under the school's track and cross country coach, Mr. Donley Mollenauer, the team won Mt. Lebanon's tenth W.P.I.A.L. title and boosted the school's number of State Championships to seven, winning this one by the widest margin in P.I.A.A. history.

The regular season saw the Mounties barely squeeze by Central Catholic and New Castle. They dropped a meet to Ambridge, the school's first loss in dual competition in four years. However, at the W.P.I.A.L. Championship meet, it was Mt. Lebanon all the way as they finished twenty points ahead of second place Wilkinsburg. At State College the following week, the Mounty harriers not only won the State Championship by a record score but also took individual honors. Bob Lyle finished first in a field of 140 to become the new individual champion, the first in the school's history. Mt. Lebanon also placed Howard Knipe, Dick Denman, and Guy Giordano among the first eleven.

The team was paced throughout the regular season by Howard Knipe and Bob Lyle, who was voted the team's most valuable member. Also placing among the first five were Dick Denman, Jim Crawford, and Guy Giordano. Other runners included J. P. Graham, Paul Garlitz, John Mehl, Bruce Fowler, Carl Templin, and Bob McCown.



The 1953 Mt. Lebanon track team upheld the Mounty tradition of superiority in track. They won all of their dual and triangular meets and placed among the leaders in championship competition.

During the indoor season Mr. Mollenauer's boys downed Central Catholic and retained the Tri-State Coaches Championship by a wide margin.

The Mounties opened the outdoor season with wins over Carrick, Washington, Dormont, and Penn. The team's greatest test came in the Mansfield Relays, the biggest high school track meet in the nation. Mt. Lebanon finished in third place, running in competition with 77 other schools and some of the best track talent in the eastern United States. The Mt. Lebanon stadium was the scene of one of the most thrilling meets in local history as the Mounties played host to the W.P.I.A.L. Relays Carnival. Mt. Lebanon finished in third place just behind Altoona and Wilkinsburg. Even in losing, the Mounties broke meet records. Crawford, Jon Thomas, Denman, and Lyle combined to set a new mark in the two-mile relay, while Schuchts, Dickinson, Berlin, and Sparrow toppled the shuttle hurdle record. Mt. 

Basketball Paced The



To finish off the year, G.A.A. Council held a picnic. In this get-together the seniors recalled events of the past three years, and presented small gold charms to the junior members.



STUDENT GOVERNMENT

The student government of Mt. Lebanon functions through two main bodies—the Executive Board, or governing body, and the Student Court, or judiciary body.

The Executive Board consists of three officers, the president of each homeroom, a representative from each senior section, and the Activities Director. The Executive Board as a body meets every Tuesday morning to hear suggestions brought to it by its council members. If the suggestions are considered important, they are discussed and voted upon. The project of the Board this year was to revise the present constitution and to change the name from the Executive Board to the Student Congress.

The Executive Board as a committee appoints all committee chairmen, temporary committees, members of the Advisory Council and Student Court members, and approves all Executive Board and homeroom nominations.

Handling the disciplinary problems of the student body is assigned to the eight members of the Student Court. Anyone receiving an out-of-order must appear before the court to present his side of the case. The Court consists of four seniors, two juniors, and two sophomores.

Mt. Lebanon should be proud of its student government; through its two governing bodies every student is given the opportunity to help govern his school.



The whole school points with pride to these outstanding students who succeeded in winning prizes for themselves and honor for our high school.




The first steps in publication start a month before the issue is sold. THE LEBANON LOG

Work on the '54 Lebanon Log was actually started in April 1953. A new staff was recruited, contracts were signed with the publishing company, and general plans were drawn up.



Band Racked Up New Honors


This was a big year in the history of the Mt. Lebanon High School Band. Perhaps the biggest yet.

Hi-Y




