

Football

Mt. Lebanon finished the 1954 season with a record of five victories and four defeats.

The Mounties, under Coach Ralph Fife, won exhibition games from Centerville, Perry, and South Hills before going on to face stiffer AA competition. The Blue Devils won their first league game since 1950 when they downed Penn 40-14. The boys were really 'up' for this game and they shook McMurry loose for five touchdown runs, none of them less than forty yards. The following week's encounter was a definite letdown as the Mounties were eliminated from the W.P.I.A.L. race by Washington. After dropping a close heart-breaking contest to Wilkinsburg, in which Short was injured and the Blue Devils led in everything but scoring, the Blue and Gold lost games to Uniontown by a close score and to a rugged Butler eleven. The Senior Recognition ceremony honoring the players of the Class of 1955 was the highlight of the Butler game. In the season's finale, Mt. Lebo swamped Westview in what might have been a preview of next year's team.



This year, Mt. Lebanon's cross country team did not maintain its usual spectacular record. The Mounties harriers won three meets and lost four during the regular season and they finished eighth at W.P.I.A.L. For the first time in six years, Mt. Lebanon failed to finish high enough to send the entire team to the P.I.A.A. Championship Meet at State College. This year, Mt. Lebo's lone representative at this meet was Bill Masterson, who placed thirty-seventh. Handicapped by early season illness, he was not in shape until late in the season. Don Davis, voted the team's most valuable member, paced the Mounties throughout most of the season. Other point-winners were seniors John Seymour, Carl Templin, and Guy Giordano. Sophomores Bob Berwind and Dave Moskovitz, who usually placed among the first five, showed great promise for the next two years. Eight lettermen will graduate this year, leaving Masterson, Moskovitz, and Berwind to form the nucleus of next year's team which we hope will regain its championship form.

The junior varsity fared better than the varsity this year, losing only one meet during the entire season. This loss was a close contest in which Central Catholic edged the JV'S by three slim' points. The JV's, paced by Anderson and Weisiger, won the W.P.I.A.L. Junior Varsity Championship Meet by such a low score that it could have been the winning score in a dual meet. Other outstanding members of the JV team were Dupuis, Prezioso, and Henderson.



Coached by Mr. Clark, the team compiled a record of 12 wins and 7 losses, with only 2 section defeats, both by Washington.

During the exhibition games, seniors George Schoeppner and Art Humphreys, juniors John Reid and Jim Beery, and sophomore Bill Roscoe earned positions in the starting lineup. Other squad members were Pete McNeish, Dave Martz, Cal Smith, John Sterrett, Bob Alter, and Fritz Walker.

The Blue and Gold won over Avalon and South Hills but lost to Wilkinsburg, Shaler, Crafton, McKees Rocks, and Stowe in exhibition games. In section games, the Mounties boasted double wins over Waynesburg, Canonsburg, Burgettstown, Trinity, and Dormont but failed to stop Washington, the section champions, in either game.

Another thriller was the first game with Waynesburg which the Mounties won 89-42. In this game the boys said, "Let George do it;" he did, with 55 points, a new school record. Although they played good ball all season, the most exciting games were the 48-41 win over Washington and the 57-51 overtime loss to Dormont. Sophomores Tom Cusick, Bill Malarkey, and Butch Truesdale, among others of the squad, will be valuable additions to next year's varsity.





This year, Mt. Lebanon won the Tri-State Coaches' Meet, the biggest and most competitive indoor meet, for the third straight year. Aiding greatly in this victory were the distance medley relay team of Knipe, Denman, Lyle, and Crawford, and the mile relay team of Rhen, Myers, Giordano, and Karlovitz. Both teams set new records of 12:38.4 and 3:36.5 respectively. Outstanding individuals throughout the indoor season were co-captains Bob Sparrow and Chet Berlin. Bob starred in the high and the low hurdles, while Chet starred in the high hurdles and the fifty yard dash.

This year's team bettered last year's in every instance except the Mansfield Relays. We dropped from third to seventh in this meet, but we won the main meets in this area, namely the Washington Invitational, the W.P.I.A.L. Relays, the Allegheny Independent Districts, and the W.P.I.A.L. Championship Meets. Mt. Lebanon's winning streak was extended to seventy-two dual and triangular meets, the last loss having occurred in 1944.

Bob Sparrow, outstanding throughout the season in both the high and the low hurdles, was voted most valuable team member by his teammates. In the Allegheny County Meet, he tied the record in the high hurdles. At the W.P.I.A.L. Relays, he was a member of both shuttle hurdle relay teams which set records of 1:04.1 and 1:26.6. In this same meet, our four-mile relay team set a record of 19:22.3. In the W.P.I.A.L. Championship Meet, our mile relay team tied the school record of 3:32.1, set just the week before, and Sparrow and Lyle were individual champions.

The members of our team who place in the P.I.A.A. Meet were: Sparrow—third in the high and the low hurdles, Lyle—third in the 880, and our mile relay team of Rhen, Myers, Karlovitz, and Crawford—fourth.

For the first time in Mt. Lebanon's history, a junior varsity track team finished the season undefeated. Outstanding performances were turned in by Masterson, Hanchey, and Overholt in track events, and Walker and Patterson in field events. Because of their able performances, these boys helped out in some varsity meets.



Weeks of hard work and preparation, consisting of reporting, copyreading, proofreading, publishing, and the mad rush of assembling, went into the making of the LANTERN. This whirl of events was handled by a staff of nearly one hundred students, directed by Miss McLaughlin. With the aid of fifty reporters who sometimes must be tracked down by FBI experts, Editor-in-chief Barbara Kern and her assistants Sally Hornell, Odette Kingsley, Maria Liadis, Barbara Reid, Sue Turner, Sheldon Parker, Ray Dilworth, and Ramon Fouse managed to edit a paper filled with happenings around school.

A supplement of the LANTERN, the Devillette, headed by Elizabeth Erskine and Cissie Rafferty, was the so-called "society section." All else was forgotten as students strained their eyes hoping to find their names listed. Everything from "who was seen where with whom" to "who had what party when" was included in this section. These tidbits were uncovered by nearly eighty reporters and printed by the typists and mimeographers without whose help the Devillette would be impossible.




school was justly proud.

This year for the first time, subscriptions to the MOUNTY were sold. About three hundred students took advantage of this offer in order to be sure that they received their copies.

An innovation this year was the meeting of editors, held each Friday after school. Here, Miss Virginia Elliott, the sponsor, helped them to choose material for coming issues. During these meetings the editors also planned the program on the production of a high school literary magazine, which the MOUNTY staff presented over WQED in December.

The activities of the yearbook staff were a combination of planning and doing. Student photographers and Mr. Rosser became common sights with their appearances at each important event.

Artists pondered over the looks of the "LOG Dog" while the 12th grade committee compiled the returns of the Senior Poll and listed the activities of each senior. As the book progressed, the typists took over and prepared write-ups for the printer. Then the editors and the art staff spent long hours making the paste-up boards which would be photographed for each page.

Thus the twenty-fifth edition of the LEBANON LOG became the largest in number of pages and circulation in the history of the book.

Band




The Range Rockettes were our favorite precision marchers.


Hi-Y

Student Government



Awards






